The Timothy Martyn Memorial Prize

In our April edition of Xavier News, we were sad to report that Dr Timothy Martyn (OX 1996) had died in Suva, Fiji, where he lived and worked with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.

His parents, Professor Rosemary Sheehan AM and Dr Gavan Martyn, have now endowed the Timothy Martyn Memorial Prize at Xavier

To honour Timothy and to remember his achievements and contributions to humanity, the prize will acknowledge the similar efforts and successes of a young graduate who has, in his first 10 years as a graduate of Xavier College, made a valuable contribution to society. Preference will be given to contributions within Asia-Pacific region and the developing

Each year the OXA Awards Committee and its Executive Officer will work with the respective cohort to identify candidates for the award, with the eventual recipient chosen by the College Principal. The intention is to announce the winner and to make the award at a Rector's Assembly each year, hopefully at the occasion at which the Xaverian Award for that year is also announced and awarded.

The Timothy Martyn Memorial Prize, awarded as a framed certificate and book, will honour Timothy by focusing attention not just on what he achieved, but on what others like him are achieving each and every year. By awarding the prize at an assembly, students will see what young graduates of our College are achieving in the world and will hopefully be inspired to walk in their footsteps – to find their own path as a man for others.

Investing in our staff to invest in our students

Investing in staff professional development is a high priority for Xavier College. The Staff Study Award program has been in place for Senior Campus staff for some time now through the generosity of the Xavier Foundation and the Eldon Hogan Trust. The program, established in 2017, has now given four staff the opportunity to develop themselves professionally through the provision of up to \$7,000 towards further study.

Zach Clarke, Head of Woodwind and recipient of the Staff Study Award has used this opportunity to further develop his skills in music.

"My investigation was into the factors that contribute to the high-level Jazz Ensemble Program at Newark Academy in Livingston, New Jersey, USA. This included school support, school culture, student workload, rehearsal duration, rehearsal technique, facilities, support from other staff and performance preparation," he said.

Zach says that to elevate his skill development as a Jazz Ensemble director, he jumped at the opportunity to do some extended study through the program.

"I decided it would be worthwhile seeing a high-level high school jazz program in action. The Essentially Ellington program in

the US aims to elevate musicianship, broaden perspectives and inspire performance in high school students. Rather than making a quick visit to the US, I wanted to dig more deeply and work for an extended time in the program."

Zach's study is already benefiting students through the introduction of workshops at both Burke Hall and Kostka Hall Campus in conjunction with Denis DiBlasio from New Jersey. Zach has also been able to refine his Jazz ensemble direction and his teaching of improvisation.

"I now approach teaching Jazz improvisation as a language and am striving to deepen my own understanding of this 'language'. I now have a greater clarity in what I am looking for when rehearing Jazz Ensembles and can now more clearly articulate this to the students. I regularly share what I have learnt with other teachers and ensemble directors in informal conversations".

Peter Robert, Head of Learning Area – the Arts is also a recipient of the Staff Study Award. Peter is completing a Master of Art Education at the University of Melbourne.

"Although it has been a plan of mine to get my Master's degree I have had neither the time or the money and when the College made the generous offer to fund this study, I then committed to finding the time," he said.

Peter is researching the reasoning behind

student engagement in studies and how the Arts can enhance and support this engagement.

"I have done a detailed investigation into the process we go through developing the Winter Play and how this extends the artistic practices of both the students and the staff involved. I have also developed a detailed course in applying cross-curricular pedagogical practices to specific Year 9 English units of study and completed an elective on how innovative classroom spaces can enhance better teaching. This has been particularly relevant to how we might modify our current spaces to better reflect our commitment to pastoral care and provide a wider range of teaching and learning experiences."

Peter is finding the study instrumental to his role at Xavier.

"The units studied so far have greatly enhanced my understanding of our current practice both within and beyond the classroom and have informed many of the conversations I am having within my faculty. I find that a lot of my academic reading has been useful to share with colleagues both within the faculty and at the Head of Learning level".

The Staff Study Awards are set to continue for three more years, allowing four staff per year the opportunity to further develop their skills and knowledge in their chosen field. Young Leaders take on NYC

The Global Young Leaders' Conference, held over the mid-year holidays, provided more 'once-in-a-lifetime' opportunities than I ever thought possible. This year, Benjamin Traficante, Henry White, Jonathan Reid, Patrick Grave, Paul Huynh and I, accompanied by Director of Senior Campus Mr Michael Ilott, had the privilege of attending the conference due to the tremendous generosity shown to us by the Eldon Hogan Trust. Held in Washington DC and New York City, the six of us had the honour of spending an astounding 10 days with 350 other students from more than 50 countries, participating in simulations, site visits and lectures throughout the program's duration.

At the commencement of the conference.the six of us were divided across 15 different leadership groups, each assigned a country to represent. There, we cultivated skills in diplomacy, leadership, teamwork, and decision-making, all the while developing a wide range of new international friends, broadening our horizons into the international community. As global young leaders, we heard from speakers from the World Bank, George Washington University, the United States Department of State as well as a range of human rights, social welfare, sustainability and environment experts. Our days were very busy, teeming with over 15 hours of some of the most challenging, yet rewarding tasks and

The conference allowed all of us to enjoy and discover the unique world of diplomatic affairs. For me, the overall highlight, and culmination of all our hard work, was the Global Summit: a mock General Assembly held at the United Nations Economic and Social Council Chambers at the UN headquarters in New York City. Working collaboratively, we drafted, proposed, debated and amended our various proposals, based on the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, for over a week. Being able to formally present our ideas to our peers, and vote on resolutions, was a surreal experience which will stay with me for a years to come.

In addition to the conference, the six of us were lucky enough to spend an extra two days in New York. We attended a Mets-Phillies baseball game and visited Times Square, Central Park and the Empire State Building. Most impressive and exciting was a private tour of the New York Stock Exchange trading floor, facilitated by Mr Thomas Anglin (OX 1991).

The Global Young Leaders' Conference had a profound impact on all who attended and we are so incredibly grateful to have been given the opportunity to participate. If it is true that we are the sum total of our experiences, I have no doubt that this experience alone has, and will continue to play, a profound role in our development as young men.
